

Held on Saturday, March 25, the meeting was full of information to help

the organization grow.

An invitation was extended to every member in OSDIA via each lodge president. The meeting was held on Zoom. Ninety-four members attended.

President Bob Bianchi reported that OSDIA continues to lose members. But there's good news, too. There is no

longer a gush of members leaving. Right now it's down to a trickle.

Bob credits several management initiatives, such as working smarter with its vendors. He also said a big plus has been OSDIA's Italian American television program.

The program grew out of National's OSDIA Interviews LIVE, which began two years ago. The Italian American program runs live in the New York City Metro Area and streams worldwide every Sunday at

The big news to come out of the meeting is a new computer application called I-Member. The National bought this database for \$19,000 and has begun to roll it out to all lodges for free.

The software is revolutionary because it allows lodges to manage their membership like never before.

For example, when you send e-mail to all members, I-Members tells you when each person received and read it.

It gives members the ability to update their own information.

Members also can RSVP for an event and pay for it, too.

Benefits for the lodge include having one membership roster and a robust place to store all your member information.

I-Member also gives lodges the ability to create publications and Websites very easily.

The meeting also covered members' events and how they can help OSDIA gain recognition: "A lodge only has to send us an unedited video of an event and we can turn it into a professional-looking

Cancer Report

New methods for detection, development, and treatment for special cancers has really progressed in the last years. Certain blood tests, immunotherapy and dogs who can sniff out tumors are some.

How about killing cancer cells with Plasma Activated Water? This has been called one of the most major advances in medical research in the past hundred years.

There are an entire range of different. frequencies all around us. What our energy harvesting nano-particle technology does is amplify them irrespective of frequency one particle at a time

Think about a tuning fork example and how the adjacent tuning fork duplicates the frequency of the other. Each of our nano-particles simply add the energy needed to amplify the vibration it sees.

THALASSEMIA FACT SHEET

- Over two million Americans carry the genetic trait for thalassemia
- Thalassemia is common among people of Mediterranean, Middle Eastern, Asian, Southeast Asian and Caribbean backgrounds.
- Parents who both carry the same kind of genetic trait for thalassemia have a 1in-4 chance with each pregnancy of having a child with a serious form of thalassemia
- Thalassemia (in its most serious form) is a fatal genetic blood disease that results in the failure to produce sufficient hemoglobin, the oxygen-carrying component of red blood cells.
- To stay alive, children born with tha-

lassemia must undergo blood transfusions every two weeks.

- Frequent blood transfusions cause iron in the transfused blood cells to build up and become toxic to tissues and organs, particularly the liver and heart
- To help remove excess iron, patients must undergo the daily infusion of a drug called Desferal, which binds iron in a process called "chelation." The drug is introduced into the body through a needle attached to a pump and inserted under the skin of the stomach or leg for up to twelve hours.
- To improve patient compliance with chelation therapy, researchers are at work on new chelators that require less frequent and prolonged infusions or may be taken orally.

- Due to improved treatments, many patients are living longer, but longer life expectancy has led to new problems. Thalassemia patients are now struggling with secondary conditions such as heart disease.
- Although chelation therapy has increased the life span of many patients, many thalassemia patients still die in infancy or childhood.
- Bone marrow transplants and gene therapy procedures, while still experimental, suggest that a cure for thalassemia may one day be perfected.



Autism Report

While working as a Special Olympics volunteer Personal Trainer Mark Fleming learned of a disturbing fitness problem for many of the participants. "There was nothing for people with autism to stay active (after the Special Olympics ended) and they would end up regressing.

A lot of the time, people with disabilities would stay at home and become sedentary.

Fleming wanted to fill that void so he started an in-home personal training service for people with autism and related disorders. That was three years ago, and this past month he opened his own gym, Puzzle Piece Fitness. The puzzle piece has long been a symbol of autism, reflecting the uniqueness of each person on the spectrum. Fleming embraces that variety.

A challenge Fleming has faced, like many new businesses, is getting people to buy in.

Dealing with the special-needs population makes marketing different, and word of mouth is the main way to market. Fleming is hoping his inhome personal training clients will come into his new gym and help spread the word and grow his business. "It's just to try to provide individuals a way to stay active no matter where they are in their life. Just seeing individuals get healthy, it's awesome, the healthier these individuals are, the more likely they are to live their best lives."

Alzheimer's Report



Experts are sharply split over the effectiveness of Aduhelm, the experimental drug for Alzheimer's disease. Two studies were stopped because the drug did not seem to be working. Then some other studies were done where they increased the dosage of the medication. These studies showed it was effective.

The FDA approved this drug because it reduced the Amyloid plaques in the brains of Alzheimer's patients. It did not show cognitive decline in these patients.

Approving Aduhelm

despite it not being effective gave false hope to millions of Alzheimer patients and might even bankrupt Medicare. Due to its. Exorbitant price of \$50,000 per year. Medicare increased its Part B. Premium from \$148.50 to \$170.10.

Eleven dollars of that increase goes to pay for Aduhelm. Biogen, the company that produces Aduhelm, is now rReducing its price to \$28,200 per year.

Alzheimer's affects six million Americans, the majority of which qualify for Medicare. Medicare is now covering Aduhelm on a case by case basis.

On a more positive note. Adding olive oil to your diet lowers your risk of Alzheimer's disease. Olive oil is packed with healthy fats, nutrients and antioxidants, and is a vital ingredient of the Mediterranean diet. The Harvard School of Public Health studied the health and diet of 60,582 women and 31,801 men from 1990 to 2018.

Those who consumed more than half

a tablespoon of olive oil had a 19% lower risk of all causes of death and 29% lower risk of Alzheimer's.





Sylvester Stallone

Sylvester Stallone was born on July 6, 1946 on the west side of Manhattan, NYC. He was the older of two sons of Frank Stallone (born in Apulia, Italy), a hair dresser and Jacqueline Stallone (French/Jewish), a dancer at Billy Rose's Diamond Horseshoe Nightclub.

Stallone's difficulties had begun with a forceps-assisted birth during which a facial nerve was severed, paralyzing the left side of his face and causing the left eyelid to droop. He developed a speech impediment which resulted in children taunting him.

At age five he moved to Silver Springs, Md., where his father was in business. He left his father's home and went to live with his mother n northeast. Philadelphia.

In 1965 he found his calling in acting in NY city. He supported himself as a salesman, a pizza demonstrator, a deli worker, a truck driver, a bouncer, a security attendant, a short order cook and an usher.

In 1970, near starvation, Stallone starred in a soft-core pornographic movie: The Party at Kitty and Stud's, for which he was paid \$200 for two days work. The character, Rocky Balboa grew out of several sources. Although film backers wanted Ryan O'Neal to star as Rocky, Stallone held out and got the role. Rocky earned \$225 million, and a Oscar nomination winning Best Picture Editing and Best Directing. He became the first person in film history to be nominated twice the same year for both acting and writing honors. Rocky also re-



ceived a Golden Globe award, the Donatello given to him in Europe, a Bell Ringer Award from Scholastic ad a National Theater Owners Award.

There are just so many awards to mention them all.

Stallone was married three times. had two sons from the first and three daughters from the third.

Somewhat disillusioned by his wealth and fame, he has said "Big money does corrupt. It puts a beard on innocence, takes away the edge, the fun, the excitement of suddenly being able to afford certain luxuries. When you can buy anything the thrill is gone. At least, it is for me"





Keeping Italian Pure

Prime Minister Giorgia Meloni's party has proposed imposing fines of up to 100,000 euros (\$108,750) on public and private entities which use foreign terms, most notably English, instead of Italian in official communications. It said the spread of English "demeans and mortifies" Italian and proposed that all public and private bodies had to use the language of Dante to promote their goods and services.

Italy Bans ChatGPT

Italy has become the first Western country to block advanced chatbot ChatGPT. The Italian data-protection authority said there were privacy concerns relating to the model.

GPT language models, it can answer your questions, write copy, draft emails, hold a conversation,

explain code in different programming languages, translate natural language to code, and more.

According to the Associated Press, the Italian Data Protection Authority will maintain the ban "until ChatGPT respects privacy." The problem with user data being visible to others during ChatGPT's March 20 outage was mentioned as the reason for this action.
