While studying at Solano Community College I worked for the U. S. Department of Defense at Mare Island Naval Shipyard as a Personnel Clerk Typist. Later I completed a Marine Electrician Apprenticeship Program in the Shop 5 electronic/ electrical trade. From Vallejo, I moved to San Francisco where I worked for Pacific Bell as a Special Services Test Desk Technician. While in San Francisco, I worked for temporary agencies, small businesses, banks, brokerage houses and the International Trade Commission. I also had a career in telecommunications. For a 10-year period, I moved to Bellevue, Washington where I worked marketing remodeling and additions of kitchens, baths, security systems, doors, windows, rain drainage systems, exterior siding and more.

In San Francisco I was married but received a no-fault divorce and an annulment from the Roman Catholic Church. I have not remarried and do not have any children. I have a biological sister, two nieces, four stepsisters and a step-brother.

I have been a member of Sons and Daughters of Italy (SOI) for five months. I enjoy the special interests of the SOI, both as a local and national organization and in furthering the Italian heritage and charitable activities. I especially admire the promotion of goodwill, ideals and its contributions to society. I find the content of meetings and events to be effective and pleasant. I enjoy volunteering and look forward to doing more with SOI.

Other than my 5 years overseas as a child, I have traveled to New York City, toured a lot of Washington State, vacationed in Hawaii, enjoyed a European trip to Paris, Nice, Monte Carlo, Monaco, Belgium and London and love going to my favorite places in Southern California — Disneyland and Universal Studios.

My favorite hobbies are traditional scrapbooking and sewing and fashion design, including alterations. A favorite past time is screening cinema and DVDs. At the Fairfield Adult Recreation Center, I belong to the Ceramics Club and the Leisure Years Card Club. I also enjoy the healthy food provided weekly by Meals on Wheels. Carissimi, è iniziato un nuovo anno!

Anzitutto mi scuso per il ritardo, non sono riuscita a tradurre la nuova cartolina ideata da Agnese in tempo... Ci siamo proposte di rimediare dandovi alcune informazioni congiunte sui mesi di Gennaio e Febbraio e sulle usanze e credenze, bizzarre e banali, che ci sono venute in mente!

Dear members, a new year has begun!

First of all, I apologize for the delay, I was unable to translate the new postcard designed by Agnese in time... We intend to make it up to you by giving you some information on both the months of January and February and on the customs and beliefs, bizarre and banal, that we could find!



Il primo mese dell'anno Gennaio. Il nome trae origine dalla divinità bicefala romana Giano, con due volti: uno dietro la testa da vecchio e uno davanti con i tratti di un bel giovane, il passato e il futuro.

Protettore delle porte e dei ponte, ne custodiva l'entrata e l'uscita e portava in mano, come i portinai, una chiave e un bastone.

First of all, the beginning of the year is identified with the two-headed Roman deity Janus, with two faces: one behind his head as an old man and one in front with the features of a handsome young man, representing the past and the future. Protector of doors and bridges: he guarded the entrance and exit and carried in his hand, like doorkeepers, a key and a stick.

Inoltre in occasione dell'Epifania, i bambini italiani attendono con ansia la Befana, vecchina brutta e mal vestita, che in groppa ad una scopa volante omaggia nella notte, senza farsi vedere tutti i piccolo. In ogni casa vengono attaccate a mensole o a rami dell'abete delle calze vuote. I bambini durante la notte sperano che il loro buon comportamento durante l'anno passato verrà ripagato con caramelle e cioccolato. Temuto è il carbone nero (fatto di dolce zucchero), dimostrazione che il bambino non è stato propriamente bravo. Come se riceve patate, carote, aglio o altre verdure (un triste minestrone!).

Furthermore, on the occasion of the Epiphany, Italian children anxiously await the Befana, an ugly and poorly dressed old lady, who on the back of a flying broom pays homage in the night, without being seen by all the children. In every house, empty stockings are attached to shelves or fir branches. Good behavior will be rewarded with sweets and chocolate. Instead black coal (made of sweet sugar) is feared, demonstrating that the child has not been exactly good. Same if the child receives potatoes, carrots, garlic and other vegetables (a very sad minestrone!).

Non so da voi ma qua in Italia fa insolitamente caldo, tanto che anche le nuotate in mare, fatte prima da pochi audaci nuotatori per il primo giorno dell'anno, ora raccolgono gruppi sempre più nutriti di persone.

Gli ultimi tre giorni del mese per sperare nell'arrivo di un vero e salutare freddo: i cosiddetti "giorni della Merla". Esistono numerose leggende.

Secondo una di queste la merla, che un tempo aveva un piumaggio bianco, andò a cercare riparo dal freddo all'interno di un camino. Il suo manto da candido diventò grigio a causa della fuliggine.

Sempre secondo le tradizioni popolari, se i giorni della merla sono freddi, la primavera sarà bella. Se al contrario sono caldi, la primavera tarderà ad arrivare.

I don't know about you but here in Italy it is unusually hot, to the point that even swimming in the sea, previously done by a few daring swimmers for the first day of the year, now brings together increasingly large groups of people. We wait for the last three days of the month to hope for the arrival of a real and healthy cold: the so-called "Merla days". There are numerous legends.

According to one of these, the blackbird, which once had white plumage, went to seek shelter from the cold inside a fireplace. Its white coat became gray due to the soot.

Again according to popular traditions, if the blackbird's days are cold, spring will be beautiful. If, on the other hand, they are warm, spring will be late in arriving.

A cavallo tra i mesi di gennaio e febbraio invece troviamo le tradizioni della danza delle spade. Al contrario delle moresche o delle danze a catena, non richiamano un atteggiamento bellicoso. Intendono celebrare l'avvicendarsi delle stagioni, con l'inverno che lascia posto alla primavera che compare radiosa nei ricchi vestiti e cappelli indossati dai contendenti, straripanti di fiori coloratissimi. Le spade vengono agitate in aria e poggiate a terra tra i vari passi di danza, a indicare la fecondazione della terra che torna ad accogliere i sementi e la vita della nuova stagione.

Between the two months we find also the traditions of the sword dance. Unlike Moorish or chain dances, they do not evoke a belligerent attitude. They intend to celebrate the changing of the seasons, with winter giving way to spring which appears radiant in the rich clothes and hats worn by the contenders, overflowing with colorful flowers. The swords are waved in the air and placed on the ground between the various dance steps, indicating the fertilization of the earth which returns to welcome the seeds and life of the new season.


