### **Project Overview**

**Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?** This project will benefit an estimated 2000 women, adolescent girls, widows, destitute, marginalized, youth and disabled in 2 villages in the Nakivale refugee camp in Isingiro district of SW Uganda by providing water and sanitation improvements and malaria eradication.

The project will work with the communities to build sanitary ArborLoo latrines with adjacent handwashing stations for every household, drill 2 safe water wells, distribute water filters, test and treat for malaria at the household level, and plant mosquito repellant vegetation.

We are following a model we implemented successfully in Northern Uganda. Our objectives in this program (1) greater than 25% reduction in diarrhea for children under 5, 2) greater than 25% reduction in malaria for children under 5, 3) a 50% reduction in

amount of HH income spent treating malaria and diarrhea, and 4) reduce by at least 50% the average time spent to fetch water) are based on the following results achieved in Northern Uganda:

- 50% reduction in diarrhea for children under 5
- eradication of malaria for children under 5
- reduction in household (hh) income spent treating diarrhea and malaria from 61% to 3%
- reduction in average time spent daily to fetch water from 3 hours 56 minutes to 15 minutes

The process we will carry out is simple:

- 1. Community assessments
- 2. Sign memoranda of understandings with community, Rotary, NGO, and government partners.
- 3. Conduct baseline sample survey of villages.
- 4. Train and equip well drilling team from villages.
- 5. Train and supervise villagers to build latrines and handwashing facilities.

6. Drill wells.

- 7. Train water women on assembly and maintenance of and distribute water filters.
- 8. Train village water committees.
- 9. Set fees for maintenance of facilities and begin collecting them.
- 10. Conduct final surveys of villages.
- 11. Carry out qualitative survey of impacts and lessons learned.

#### Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?

Mystery Gorilla Foundation will work closely with the Mbarara Rotary Club to implement the grant because Mystery Gorilla has an established, trust relationship with the community. They will coordinate training for maintenance of water filters, welldrilling, latrine and hand-wash station construction, and will coordinate with local health officials for malaria testing and treating and health-related workshops. They will conduct the baseline and year-end surveys. They will work with Mbarara Rotary Club to arrange for timely purchase and delivery of needed materials and will arrange for storage.

# Describe the roles and responsibilities that the host and international sponsors will have in this project. Please be specific. Which sponsor will receive and manage the grant funds?

The host club, Mbarara Rotary Club, will receive and manage the grant funds and will disburse funds as needed to purchase equipment and pay vendors. They will forward copies of all accounting and receipts to the Rotary Club of Coconut Grove which will prepare and submit the grant reports. The Mbarara Club will monitor progress and coordinate with Mystery Gorilla Foundation to send photos and documentation to the international partner.

Describe how the partnership between the host and international sponsors was formed. What agreement have the sponsors made toward ensuring that the project will be implemented successfully? How will they manage any challenges that arise throughout the project?

Helene Dudley is founder and CEO of TCP Global which entered an agreement in March, 2021 to build sustainable loan pools for savings groups affiliated with Mystery Gorilla Foundation (MGF). Helene is past-president of the Rotary Club of Coconut Grove, the international partner. MGF serves as fiscal agent for 18 savings groups which benefit from TCP Global funds. MFG's Director, Bruno Mugisha, learned of WASH GG2237714 currently being implemented in Yumbe, Uganda while participating in Zoom calls with TCP Global beneficiaries in Yumbe who are implementing the grant. Bruno contacted the Mbarara Club about doing a similar project in Isingiro.

The pre-existing and ongoing, close working relationship of P2P, TCP Global and MGF, all of which have extensive histories of implementation successes, virtually guarantees a successful implementation. MOUs will be signed to document roles, responsibilities and commitments. Based on the experience in Yumbe, as problems arise, the Rotarians and project implementers will discuss the problems, and come to an agreement on solutions via Zoom and email. To avoid surprises, a schedule of tasks, costs, responsible person, etc will be prepared at the start of the project. During the initial implementation stage, we will have 1-2 zoom calls per month involving P2P, Mystery Gorilla, representatives from the host and international clubs and any other parties deemed appropriate.

#### **Project planning**

#### Describe the community needs that your project will address.

Nakivale hosts 188,914 refugees in 79 villages each with 800-1,000 people. In Nakivale settlements, water supply is a major challenge due to unreliability, insufficiency, deteriorating water quality, high level of chemical contamination of ground water, and high operation and maintenance costs due to fragmentation of the water system. The current WASH systems in Nakivale do not have a sustainable operation and maintenance model. Moreover, the lack of toilet facilities is severe with most households still practicing open defecations. This has exacerbated the diarrhea occurrence incidences that often drain the family's'meager savings in treatment costs.

Malaria, a significant global health concern, particularly in regions with limited resources and poor healthcare infrastructure like Isingiro District, where Nakivale is located, poses a significant burden on communities, leading to economic loss and increased mortality rates, especially among refugee and host community populations.

MGF attempted to alleviate the water shortage by supporting families to construct covered 9ftx6ftx5ft underground tarpwalled water harvesting tanks with an installed simple self-designed pump made out of PVC pipes. However, this is not sustainable because the tarpaulin must be replaced every 6 to 8 years and the water is not "clean" drinking water, still requiring treatment before consumption. Therefore, Sawyer water filters are a critical need.

#### How did your project team identify these needs?

According to an Isingiro District report, only 30% of its residents have access to safe water, and access to safe water by Nakivale Refugee settlement remains at only 28%

A study of children's health in Uganda refugee camps found a 98.7% malaria infection rate in Isingiro. An April, 2023 report of the National Library of Medicine, concluded: "The persistence of the malaria infections were mainly due to open water sources, poor hygiene, and lack of preventive measures that enhanced mosquito survival and infection. Malaria elimination in refugee settlements requires an integrated control approach that combines environmental management with other complementary measures like insecticide treated bed nets, indoor residual spraying and awareness."

#### How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

Mystery Gorilla Foundation (MGF) was started by conservation enthusiasts with academic backgrounds.from marginalized communities They committed to work for village development on the principle of 'farming-in-love with nature'. Guidance from important elders in the community lead them to establish an activist group to work for species, habitat and environmental conservation, rural livelihood improvement and development. This project is the most recent focus of their activism.

#### How were community members involved in planning the project?

While solutions were generally understood from the start -- boreholes were needed to provide access to water, sanitary latrines were needed to stop open defamation and control spread of disease, and the community wanted to reduce malaria -- there were choices to be made regarding the best way forward. The community will choose the location of the boreholes, dependent of course on the location of underground water sources. Several types of latrines are appropriate for community construction projects: some require large pits that fill within 10-20 years; more expensive models are constructed to allow extraction of the composted feces after a period of time. The community chose the Arbor-loo model which allows for the above-ground, user facility structure to be moved to a new location when the pit is full. The pit is then covered with soil and a tree or bushes are planted in the rich compost. This is consistent with their conservationist origins, allowing the human waste to enrich the soil in a safe way..

#### Briefly describe the other initiatives and how they relate to this project.

TCP Global provides funds to enhance the loan pools of a Village Savings and Loan Association in one of the villages and in 7 of the villages applying for future such projects. Once borrowers are freed from abject poverty, they have the time, energy and resources to work to build a better and healthier tomorrow.

#### Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.

- Participatory learning and action to generate, set priorities and rank preferences.
- Awareness creation meeting on preservation of personal hygiene, water management and sanitation through household latrines in every individual household
- \* Sensitization on the dangers of poor sanitation and hygiene
- \* Selection and orientation of community-based masons/artisans
- \* Trainings on Water and Sanitation practices, liquid soap/sanitizer making.
- \* Trainings on drilling, repairing and maintenance of water supply boreholes
- Procurement and distribution of construction materials for construction of boreholes and latrines, water filtration kits, insecticide treated mosquito nets, malaria drugs, and liquid soap/sanitizer raw materials.

• Organize workshops and training sessions for community leaders, village health workers, and volunteers to disseminate accurate information on malaria prevention and treatment.

The purpose of the above is

- To create awareness of the importance of a clean and sanitized environment
- To ensure participants understand the importance of household latrines and the ill effects of open defecation
- \* To motivate the community to participate in the construction of the household latrines, with hand-washing facility.
- To motivate the women, children and the entire community to use latrines, maintain the bore holes and water filters properly, so they can reduce waterborne diseases.
- To help people understand the importance of working together as a community to improve sanitation, health and hygiene and maintain a safe water supply.
- \* To encourage planting of mosquito repellant saplings near homes in order to maintain a more mosquito-free environment.
- **\*** To strengthen community-based surveillance and early detection and treatment of malaria cases.

#### How were these needs identified?

These training/outreach/educational programs provide the knowledge needed to reduce the leading causes of illness, medical expenses, school/work absences, and deaths.

## What incentives (for example, monetary compensation, awards, certification, or publicity), will you use, if any, to encourage community members to participate in the project?

These two communities were selected from 9 that requested these particular community improvements. They already asked for the programs and therefore there is no need to encourage people to participate in the program. Based on prior experience, we understand that a bore hole is the top priority for most communities. Therefore, we will drill the wells only after the communities have constructed all the latrines and hand-wash stations and implemented use of the Sawyer Water Filters.

One-fourth of the households will be trained in the proper use and maintenance of water filters. They, in turn are required to share the filter with 3 nearby households. Water committee members will also be trained to monitor the water filters to make sure they are used properly. Each household will maintain its own latrine and hand-wash station. The water committees are responsible for collecting water fees to be used in maintaining the wells. The well drillers will be trained during the grant implementation period to drill and maintain wells. It is anticipated that the newly-trained well drillers will continue drilling and repairing wells as a way to supplement their family incomes. Thus this grant project will benefit the entire community by providing a local well drilling repair service.

# Describe how community members will maintain the equipment after grant-funded activities conclude. Will replacement parts be available?

The water committees will establish a fee schedule for those who benefit from the well, with the funds to be used for maintenance and repairs Since local artisans will be trained to both drill and maintain wells, the expertise will be locally available to address future maintenance issues. Parts for the locally constructed wells are available in Uganda.

#### Please explain.

Villagers throughout Uganda, the DRC and Niger have been trained to successfully maintain Sawyer Water filters which can serve 4 families for 10 years with proper maintenance.

Local teams will be trained to drill their own wells. In the process, they gain the knowledge to maintain and repair wells. As an extra bonus, the villagers trained in well drilling also gain the knowledge and tools needed to earn a living drilling wells for other villages. This well drilling technology is used throughout Africa and is culturally appropriate.

# After the project is completed, who will own the items purchased by grant funds? No items may be owned by a Rotary district, club, or member.

Water filters will be owned by individual families and shared with 3 neighbors. Latrines and hand-wash stations will be owned by the individual family served. Mosquito nets stay with the family. Wells are communally owned.

Water committees will establish a user fee for those who use the borehole well. Those fees will cover maintenance. Families will maintain their own latrines and hand-wash stations. Household income saved by elimination of expenses to treat preventable diseases will ensure that each family has the ability to maintain their facilities. Properly maintained water filters will last up to ten years.

Water usage fees will generate minimal funds. Only minimal funds are needed to maintain the improvements funded by this grant.
